Teentech 2017 - CONNECTING GIRLS AND TECHNOLOGY

Teentech is a project of the American Association of University Women New Jersey (AAUW NI) in collaboration with various New Jersey colleges/universities. It is designed to encourage young women to further their education in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) fields.

AAUW's report, Gender Gaps, indicated that young women lag behind young men in acquiring technical proficiencies. The report cites evidence that girls are more likely to use technology when they see its real-world applications. AAUW's research, Why So Few?, documents that women are still underrepresented in high-demand, high-paying STEM careers.

Teentech will be a day of hands on workshops designed to demonstrate that technology, engineering, and computer science are exciting and relevant. High school girls from all over the state will work together with faculty and students of the host institution to learn and practice technology-based problem-solving in a college laboratory setting. Students must be accompanied by educators and/or adult chaperones who will have their own workshop experience and panel discussion of how to encourage girls to pursue STEM education and career.

Tween Tech offers girls reasons to love science

GALLOWAY TOWNSHIP — Yamylette Rojas, 14, of Atlantic City couldn't pick just one thing she liked best about Friday's Tween Tech workshops at Stockton University.

"Everything was cool," said Rojas, who wants to be an engineer working with robotics. She did finally cite the virtual reality session as a favorite.

More than 220 girls in grades seven and eight attended the second Tween Tech Friday sponsored by the American Association of University Women and Stockton University. The event introduces girls to the possibilities of a career in the sciences.

Linda Harmon, president of the Atlantic County chapter of the AAUW said



their goal is also to show girls that they can be successful in science careers. A retired teacher, she recalls wanting to be a civil engineer, but was never encouraged to pursue that field. "I was pretty much told I could be a teacher or a nurse," she said. "We want to show girls they need to believe in themselves." The 20 workshops were led by Stockton alumni faculty, staff and students with support from the Women in Engineering of New Jersey. Students made ice cream with liquid

nitrogen, built flashlights, investigated crime scenes and learned about the workings of the brain.

"The liquid ice cream was cool," said Kimberly Torres, 14, of Atlantic City. "When you ate it, smoke came out of your mouth."

Stockton professor Tara Luke led the workshop on building a flashlight. She said none of the girls had ever used a soldering iron before, and that alone was a valuable lesson.

"It's important to be comfortable around tools," she said. "This gives them the confidence that they learned a new skill, that this is not something they have to be afraid of."

Riley Hieb, 12, of Linwood talked about having to "screw things in and cut wires" as she made a laser that created patterns.

Michelle Wendt, who led a workshop on building a landing pad for a spaceship said the entire event consisted of hands-on experiences, and not just using a computer.

Claudine Keenan, dean of the School of Education at Stockton, said she is also interested in how educators can support girls interested in sciences and overcome the subtle gender bias and stereotyping that can still discourage girls from pursuing science and math careers.

Stockton and the AAUW also sponsor a summer week-long Tech Trek Camp for middle school girls. Keenan said having women lead the workshops sent the message that they, too, can succeed in sciences.

"Girls can identify with them," she said. "We want to fuse together the young people, young adults and senior professionals."

With this experience, we got to take home very important information that could help us in our future. This program has given me the opportunity to explore the different fields of STEM and think about our possible careers. This program has empowered us girls to believe in ourselves. We were able to explore the campus and have the possibility of going to college here (The food was great too!). We are grateful to Tween Tech for involving us in this endeavour.

Tech Trek - a program of AAUW

Volunteer for Tech Trek New Jersey 2017 !

Volunteering with Tech Trek is a great way to get involved in helping 8th grade girls discover their potential in STEM. Tech Trek is staffed almost entirely by volunteers, and couldn't be done without volunteer efforts. All overnight volunteers receive reimbursement for obtaining required clearance, complimentary room and board on campus, and a modest stipend.

Selection Committee Members are AAUW volunteers responsible to read all nominations and applications, following Tech Trek selection criteria and guidelines. Some selection committee members will also be responsible to conduct interviews with prospective campers and their parents or guardians.

Dorm Monitors are responsible for a small group of Tech Trek campers, provide emotional support, and respond to campers' questions and concerns for 2-3 day shifts throughout the week.

Each Dorm Monitor will have a "dorm group" Of seven to ten girls. Dorm Monitors will hold daily meetings with their dorm groups and keep track of their whereabouts throughout the day. They will accompany girls to campus activities and field trips and will be in charge of the enforcement of camp rules and policies. Dorm Monitors will rotate throughout the camp and pass along updates to their replacements for each shift.

Workshop Presenters should be organized, prepared and have a disposition that reflects excitement for Tech Trek and STEM learning. They should have a good reputation in their workplaces, schools, or communities as an involved STEM practitioner or educator and role model.


