April 25, departure time to be announced: Tour of Bowman's Hill Wildflower Preserve located in New Hope, Bucks County, Pennsylvania in the Pidcock Creek Valley.

The Preserve contains over 700 native plants on 134 acres. There are 4 and 1/2 miles of trails. The Preserve was created in the 1930's in part by vision of Mary K. Parry who was then Chairman of the Bucks County Federation of Women's Clubs. The Parry trail which is a beautiful trail of Bluebells is named for her. The guided two hour tour will include walking on trails that are mostly easy walking on mulch but are not meant for wheelchairs though visitor center and few concrete trails are available. Lunch will be arranged by reservation at Bowman Hill Tavern which is nearby. Two car pools have been arranged with space for 3 people in each car. The guided tour is limited to 10 people.
