NJ AAUW TRIP TO SENECA FALLS

AAUW of New Jersey members went on an overnight bus trip to Seneca Falls NY on September 19. We visited the site of the Seneca Falls Convention, the first women's rights convention. The lobby displays life size bronze statues of the following organizers: Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Lucretia Mott, Mary Ann MClintock, Martha Wright, Jane Hunt, Frederick Douglas, James Mott, Thomas MClintock, and Richard Hunt.

This convention declared that "All men and women are created equal." The convention took place in 1848 but women didn't get the vote till 1920.

We also visited The Harriett Tubman museum in Auburn NY. The museum included a dramatic presentation by a re-enactor. He portrayed the life of Harriett Tubman and her connection to Auburn. She built the first Old-Age Home there. This was a facility for elderly free Blacks who had never had one before. We had a tour of the building.

This was of particular interest to those of us in Cape May as we anticipate the opening of the Harriett Tubman Museum here next year.

AAUW FALL FOCUS MEETING

AAUW of NJ held a Fall Focus event, "Empowering Ourselves for 2020," on October 12th at the DoubleTree Mount Laurel. The agenda included presentations from NJ Treasurer, Marian Wattenbarger, and Mary Graves, Charitable Trust Chair, who provided information about the NJ Charitable Trust, finance, budget and project seed money, and from AAUW National, Tremayne Parquet, Deputy Director of Advancement, who presented organization successes (and mentioned challenges!) in 2019.

Marge Price, Founder and Chair of Princeton Community Works, a nonprofit consultant, conducted an eye-opening and heart-warming workshop on simple and expedient ways to develop communication and trust to engage participants in any venue, and especially to engage and empower individuals to focus on a task ahead.

AAUW member Nino Del Collo facilitated a discussion with a Tech Trek camper and her Mom about the Tech Trek experience. It was refreshing to hear the exuberance of a participant, who attended a small school and did not have peers among her classmates who were interested in the sciences. She bonded immediately with other Tech Trekkers, and formed friendships that continue beyond the camp.

Finally, Jacqueline McGuinness, State Secretary, conducted a workshop using the SMART technique to clearly set goals and formulate plans to achieve them.

It was a pleasure to exchange ideas and challenges with attendees from many branches in NJ, and a wonderful buffet lunch was enjoyed by all!
