BOOK NOOK

Greetings Fellow Readers,

Happy May Day to all and Happy Mother's Day to all the moms and grandmoms in our group! I must confess that I was scrambling for an idea for this month until after our book discussion on Wednesday. As we were talking about *Simon the Fiddler* one of our members said that she liked it when an author carried a character from one book to another. That comment led me to think about fictional characters that I follow in different book series. I wondered if you all had favorite series too.

I think the first book series I read was Nancy Drew beginning in elementary school. To date there are 175 books in the series written by Carolyn Keene, a pseudonym for different authors through the years. The series was commissioned as a series for girls to mirror the Hardy Boys for boys!

As an adult there is a series that I read straight through because of Steve Weis, husband of Karen. Many years ago he suggested and led the discussion for any book featuring Horatio Hornblower by C. S. Forester. I was dubious about the choice but read the first Hornblower book. I was captivated by the character and writing and went on to read all 11 books.

After several friends recommended author Louise Penny to me I decided to read her. I had been warned to read the books in order so I started with *Still Life* and was hooked. They are mysteries with Chief Inspector Armand Gamache as the main character. The setting is a small village, Three Pines, on the border between Quebec and Vermont and not shown on any maps. The characters are unique and diverse, the mysteries engrossing, and Gamache a master investigator. Again, one book and I was hooked. I reserved the books in order, two at a time, from the library and read the whole series. I believe she has a new book coming out soon.

If you need a good laugh, try Janet Evanovich's twenty-seven books featuring Stephanie Plum. She works for her cousin who is a bail bondsman in Trenton NJ. Her job is to find and bring in anyone who has skipped bail. She works with her best friend, Lula, who is larger than life and unforgettable. Their misadventures tracking down and apprehending the bad guys make me laugh out loud.

If you like murder mysteries Jonathan Kellerman writes a series with Alex Delaware, a child and forensic psychologist who works with the LAPD as a consultant. Most of his cases come from Detective Milo Sturgis and the plots are always engrossing. If you like mysteries this is only one of many series from which to choose.

Finally I will mention my secret vice, the Jack Reacher novels by Lee Child. They aren't particularly well-written and the plots are contrived and often predictable but there is something about Reacher that makes me return to these books after reading a string of challenging books. By the way, if you saw the movie based on Child's main character, Tom Cruise makes a lousy Jack Reacher!!

Enough about book series! Our next book discussions will be with ZOOM meetings. The Daytime Group will meet on May 18 and discuss *Madame Bovary;* the Evening Group will meet on May 26 and discuss *The Martian.* Remember to read your email and check the website, capemay-nj.aauw.net, for up to date information.

Finally I'd like to thank Connie Blocher for being my co-chair for the past several years. I will miss her help in choosing books and expertly leading discussions. She is taking a well-deserved break but will still be part of both discussion groups.

I'm sure you have received email from AAUW about the upcoming national election. In that regard, on April 1st, AAUW held a nationwide Town Hall meeting to discuss a proposed change to the By-Laws that would remove the educational degree requirement for membership. Reasons cited for this change are declining and aging membership and ineligibility for grant funding because of the educational membership requirement. The Town Hall provided an opportunity for all to express their pro and con leanings and the reasoning behind it. In support of the change, women thought that the change is needed in response to changing attitudes and demographics, and is an opportunity to offer all women the ability to support the AAUW mission. In opposition, women thought that it will change the nature of the organization, that the organization provides a forum for women who have earned a degree, and that the term "University" in the organization name would be problematic.

Whatever your opinion, please be sure to vote by 5 pm (EDT), May 17th on this important issue, as well as to select national Board of Directors and public policy priorities.
