The program will be on **Friday, June 11 at 10:00 am**. If you were unable to attend the first presentation, this is your opportunity to see it. Why would you want to visit a cemetery? There are many reasons. The tombstones can give a little lesson in art history, symbolism, and changing attitudes towards death and the afterlife. Until about the 1850s most people in the U.S. were buried in churchyards or in family burial plots on their own property. Thus, there are many small cemeteries scattered about New Jersey, some with only one or two graves. About two years ago, Karen Weis and Carolyn Bassett spent several days locating and visiting several of these cemeteries.

Children could only check out four books at a time. I would look for the fattest and well worn books that I could find, much to my mother's dismay. My thinking was that a fat book would take longer to read and a well worn book must have been enjoyed by a lot of children. I still like long books that I can lose myself in!

I have become a little more discriminating in my choices since then but I'm still rather random in my reading. I have loaded many books on my Kindle from the daily cheap choices on BookBub. Public Policy Proposals Adopted

Through the national elections held in May, the AAUW Public Policy proposals for 2021-2023 were adopted by 92% of AAUW voters. Public policy continues to focus on Removing Bias from Education, Fighting for Fair Pay and Economic Equity and Advancing Women in Leadership.

Studies using the Implicit Association Test (IAT) have shown that most people more easily associate men with science and women with the arts, men with careers and women with homemaking, and men with being leaders and women with being supporters. For example, academic scientists who looked at identical résumés belonging either to "John" or "Jennifer" perceived Jennifer as less competent.
