We are meeting at **5pm** for appetizers. Everyone is encouraged to bring a favorite appetizer of their own but that is not required as there will be plenty there. Masks are not required.

We will socialize and eat from 5pm to 6. Then have our book discussion of *The Innocent Man* by John Grisham from 6 to 7:30. For those who love sunsets, you can stay watch the sunset at 7:45.

BOOK NOOK

Welcome back Cape May AAUW Book Lovers! Both Daytime and Evening book groups will begin meeting monthly in September - Daytime at 12 noon on the 3rd Tuesday and Evening on the 5th Wednesday at 5:00. We had to juggle some dates and times so please check the list of titles to verify time and place in the monthly newsletter.

One afternoon this summer my daughter, an elementary school librarian, and I were discussing our reading habits along with my grandson who just turned 13 and is in 7th grade. We are all readers with different tastes and interests. In addition to reading for pleasure my daughter has to keep up with new books for her library including many graphic novels. My grandson has read the Harry Potter series and Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings* series several times but has fallen in love with graphic novels too. It seems that this genre is becoming popular with all ages.

This discussion started me thinking about my childhood and how my reading habits have changed. When I was in elementary school I went to the library regularly and devoured as many books as I was allowed to check out. But

I also loved comic books! I used 10 cents of my weekly allowance to walk to the local drugstore and purchase a comic book. I kept them all and lent them to neighborhood kids after I had read them over and over. My favorites were Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck, Archie, and Little Lulu. I even made my own Little Lulu paper dolls. I also loved the funnies in the newspaper. One of my favorite memories is sitting on my father's lap while he read the Sunday funnies to me.

Which brings me to the real topic of this column - graphic novels. They are becoming more and more popular with elementary and middle school children and are appearing on best seller lists. My daughter has been reading books on the Reading Olympics list for school. She gave me one, a graphic novel, to critique for age appropriateness. *White Bird* by R. J. Palacio is a story about hiding a Jewish boy from the Nazis. It was extremely well done but we thought it should be listed for 10 and up. This reminded me of when I was still teaching in the early 1990s and *Maus 1 + 2* by Art Spiegelman was released. This was the first graphic novel to receive academic attention. I ordered it for my classroom through Scholastic books. After I read it I decided that my 7th graders would need parental permission to borrow it. It is the story of a Jewish survivor of Hitler's Europe and his son. This remains the most chilling depiction of the Holocaust that I have ever read even though the Nazis are cats and the Jews are mice in the graphics.

I've been doing some more research on graphic novels for adults. With the help of Kara Buono, the Collection Development Librarian in charge of graphic novels at the Cape May County Library, I have discovered a new genre that I would like to introduce to both of our discussion groups in the spring. Kara put together a list of a few of the graphic novels that she thought our groups would enjoy. I just finished reading graphic adaptations of *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald and K. Woodman-Maynard and *To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee and Fred Fordham. Both were enjoyable and true to the

originals although the styles of narration and illustration were very different.

The next graphic novels I read will be from the fiction and nonfiction lists. Kara included a short description of each book she cited which will help me make my choices. I don't think I am quite ready for The Avengers but there are many other story lines more to my reading tastes. I will report back to you in my October Book Nook column as I continue my adventures with graphic novels.

I'm really looking forward to seeing many of you as we laugh our way through lunch at the Daytime Meeting on September 21 reviewing the adventures of Stephanie Plum in the Janet Evanovich books and at our Evening Group discussion of *The Innocent Man* by John Grisham on September 29 which will be more serious but just as enjoyable. 


