

It is over half a century since pay discrimination became illegal in our country, yet the pay gap remains for white women at \$0.83 cents compared to the \$1.00 men earn. For women of color, the gap is even more drastic

\$0.55 for Latinas, \$0.60 for Native Americans and Alaskans, \$0.63 for Black and Pacific Islander women. AAUW's extensive report "The Simple Truth about the Pay Gap" can be found here:

This quote in the report puts the disparity in perspective: "Men's jobs generally pay better than women's, even after accounting for their skill and education requirements. For instance, full-time parking lot attendants (usually men) are paid more to watch cars than full-time child-care workers (usually women) are paid to care for children, even though child-care workers are increasingly being pushed to earn a college credential."

At the current rate of progress, the gender pay gap won't be closed until 2111. We don't want to wait that long!
