BOOK NOOK

Way back in January I challenged all of you to think about all the books you have read and send me a list of three books that have changed you in some way. I promised to let you know the results of this challenge.

I issued the challenge after reading *The Reading List* by Sara Nisha Adams. The Daytime Group discussed this book in April and we shared our lists before we began the book discussion. For me this sharing was one of the most meaningful discussions that I can remember. Each individual approached their list differently and the books mentioned covered a large range of topics and genres. There were eight of us sharing: two books from *The Reading List* were mentioned; two classics that appear on lists of books that "everyone should read"; one poetry book; some biographies/autobiographies; several historical novels; and two science fiction books.

A couple of members approached the challenge by choosing a book from childhood, a book from high school or college, and a book from adulthood. One of us spoke about reading books that culminated with meeting the authors in person. Others told of books that led to trips to visit places that were mentioned or trips that led them to find books about the things they had seen. Many contemporary books, some from our own discussions, were also mentioned.

As we talked about our lists we learned about each other. Some of us were emotional and teary-eyed as we shared what specific books meant to us. The mention of some titles led to what we used to call "bird walks" in teaching where we got off-topic and reminisced about a book from one of our lists. Even members who hadn't written a formal list remembered books that were special to them.

I want to thank everyone who took part in this challenge and shared their list even though there was some grumbling about how hard the assignment was. As we talked about these books it reaffirmed for me the importance of books in our lives and how bleak life would be if we didn't have access to the printed word. Being able to share these books with a discussion group is like icing on the cake!
