These donations can be made from your yearly Required Minimum Distribution from your traditional IRA. You will need to review the procedure with your investment firm. But basically, you fill out a special QCD form naming the charity you wish to receive your contribution and the amount desired and a check will be sent directly to the charity in your name. Thus, you don't have to pay federal taxes on that donated amount which counts towards your required distribution. There are some exclusions and other rules, of course.

The page has a feature that allows a searcher to select a particular state, the US Congress, or to search on a bill number or text phrase. It is a free public service for individuals monitoring their home state and Congress, with expanded professional services available. Nice to know this tool is out there!
