Captain Bob and Patti thoroughly narrated our trip, pointing out landmarks as well as birds, and answered our questions. We enjoyed nice weather in the Cape May bubble and had a wonderful time.

Greetings Fellow Readers,

I hope everyone had a great summer filled with fun, friends, family and, of course, reading! My summer was a mixed bag of tricks because my husband had a hip replaced and our daughter and 15—year-old grandson were our caretakers. It was great to have them here for almost 6 weeks and they took excellent care of us with our son pitching in when needed. The house seems empty with just the two of us but my husband is doing well and things are back to normal.

My topic for this month is CHOICE. Life is full of choices: good or bad; easy or hard; minor or life-changing. They started when we were babies; red ball or blue ball, green shirt or yellow shirt. Let me tell you a story about a birding friend of ours. She is retired and lived alone in a nice house that bordered on a small park in a small town in PA. She recovered from that, then had another fall and broke her left leg. She also had to deal with a flooded basement, two leaking pipes which caused part of the kitchen ceiling to collapse and a leaking roof that had to be replaced. All this happened in two years! She realized she could no longer

live alone. Fortunately, after looking at five facilities, she found a place not too far away where she has a small house and yard and has access to continuing care as needed - a life-changing choice that she hadn't even thought about three years ago.

I also thought about choices when Joan Vicari and I spent an entire afternoon at my dining room table trying to choose books for both of our discussion groups. We wanted to select books for September through January, leaving the spring months open so our group members could suggest more titles of interest. We thought about the preferences of our members. We looked at old and new books, checked availability and read reviews. We finally came up with the choices listed in this newsletter.

Now YOU have choices: to read or not to read; to attend or not to attend a discussion; and to suggest or not to suggest additional books for us to consider.






Rock, Paper, Scissors by Alice Feeney
