Tech Trek 2023 was held at the Stockton University campus from July 23-29. Thirty-five girls from many counties in NJ spent the week attending core STEM courses in biotechnology, robotics and ornithology in the morning, with two shorter topical sessions each afternoon. BOOK NOOK

Dear Fellow Readers,

Being part of a book discussion group means that you read a variety of books - nonfiction and fiction of all sorts such as historic, mystery, fantasy, and science fiction. Most times I hope you can say, "Wow, that was a really good book!" But sometimes you will have to admit that you didn't like the book at all. Hence my topic for this month: What makes a good book?

First I did some research to find out what literary experts had to say. The first article I encountered was by a group called masterclass.com, a site designed to encourage and teach new writers.

According to them there are 5 elements of a good book.

- 1. A Strong Opening: A good book hooks you on the first page and doesn't let you go until the last word. A book is only as strong as its opening and may be the difference between someone reading the book or putting it back on the shelf.
- 2. <u>Compelling characters</u>: Good characters give us someone to love, hate, or identify with. They give us insight into human nature. The protagonist is the most important but the antagonist and other characters should be well developed too.
- 3. An absorbing story: Readers want to be entertained or challenged from the inciting

incident through the rising action to the climax. We want to be captivated by the plot until the very last word.

- 4. <u>Sharp dialogue</u>: Good dialogue should sound natural and flow to advance the story. Conversations should not be stilted but sound as if the characters are real. If dialects are used they should add to the story not confuse the reader.
- 5. <u>Unique style</u>: Writing style is the voice or tone a writer uses to tell the story. Every writer has their own style which is reflected by the types of literary devices they use. Humor, plot twists, and kind of narration are examples.

I found several websites where readers were asked to respond to the question: what makes a book worth reading? The answers were as different as the readers writing them; however, there were a few things that were mentioned frequently. Content was one. Readers like to be challenged, to learn something new, to be able to connect to the content emotionally. We want a captivating story and well developed characters who seem like real people. Often we want a story that has relevance to our own lives, telling about situations similar to what is happening in our own life. Lastly, the book must be well written. Poor writing can doom a book even if it has a good story to tell.

For me a good book is one that grabs my attention so thoroughly that I am unaware of my surroundings while I am reading. I like to feel that I am in the story, a "fly on the wall"


so to speak. I want the characters to be people I can laugh and cry with, people that I would like to meet in person. When I meet characters like these I want to meet them again in other stories; I like to read books in a series. Most of all a good book is one that I don't want to end! What makes a good book for YOU?

Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "Tis the good reader that makes the good book; a good head cannot read amiss: in every book he finds passages which seem confidences or asides hidden from all else and unmistakably for his ear."



AAUW Public Policy



Over the summer, AAUW Public Policy advocates met with the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) Coalition to discuss current paths forward to pass legislation in Congress that will eliminate the original tenyear deadline for passage of the ERA contained in the Preamble and allow the Amendment to become law. The amendment has been approved by the

required three-fourths of states - the last was Virginia in 2020.
