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#### **BOOK NOOK**

Greetings Fellow Readers,

Here's wishing you all a Happy Healthy 2024! This month I decided to highlight a few of my favorite living female authors. As I thought about my topic and started listing names, I had enough to fill several pages! I managed to whittle the list down to nine women whom I follow and look forward to their next book.

My first two authors write nonfiction which is not usually my go to genre. Doris Kearns Goodwin is an award-winning author who is able to weave facts into stories that make history come alive. We had a lively discussion in our Evening Group when we read *The Bully Pulpit: Theodore Roosevelt and the Golden Age of Journalism.* I also recommend *Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln* which showed a side of Lincoln that I hadn't found in biographies.

Candice Millard writes history too. The River of Doubt: Theodore Roosevelt's Darkest Journey was a book that I could not put down. It's hard to believe that he and his companions lived to tell the tale. Destiny of the Republic: James Garfield's Assassination is another book that I found riveting. Garfield should have lived; I found myself trying to talk to the doctors who

treated him. These books were also discussed in our Evening Group.

I especially enjoy Historical Fiction. Throw in a little fantasy in the form of time travel with the history and Diana Gabaldon wins the prize for best series with The Outlander books. Claire Randall, a WW II nurse, goes back in time to Scotland in the 1700s where she meets and falls in love with a Highland warrior, Jamie Fraser. She is able to go back and forth in time and eventually decides to stay with Jamie. There are ten books in the series and it isn't over yet! She has also written several novellas about supporting characters as well as a chronology. There is a TV series made from the books but I haven't watched it because I don't think any actors can replace my mind pictures of Claire and Jamie!

Geraldine Brooks, an Australian author, writes about many different time periods and subject matter. We just discussed Horse which went back and forth between the 2000s and the 1800s in the United States. The modern story took place in Washington DC and involved art history and racism. The historical part dealt with slavery, horse racing and the role of black horse trainers. These seemingly disparate subjects were seamlessly woven into a story that begged to be talked about. The Year of Wonders, another favorite of mine, deals with the plague in Europe in the 1500s. There were a lot of similarities to our Covid Pandemic.

Most of the books I read, except the ones for book groups, are fiction. One of my favorite fiction writers is Jodi Picoult who

has written approximately 30 books. I like her books because, in addition to telling a good story, she also includes a central issue or problem that is thought-provoking. Two of my favorites are *My Sister's Keeper*, about using a second child as an organ donor for an older sister and *Nineteen Minutes*, about a school shooting.

I love mysteries and follow several different authors and detectives. In one series I enjoy traveling to Three Pines, a little village on the border between Canada and Vermont that doesn't appear on any maps. Louise Penny, a Canadian writer, has created an idyllic setting with a diverse group of residents where Chief Inspector Gamache of the Sûreté du Québec gets called frequently. There are 18 books so far. I even have my husband reading them!!

Lisa Scottoline, who lives in nearby Chester County, PA, writes standalone mysteries and two different series. She is a lawyer turned writer who practiced in Philadelphia. Rosato and Assoc. and Rosato and DiNunzio are all female law firms in Philadelphia in her series books. My favorite standalone book is *What Happened to the Bennetts?* I learned about how the witness protection program works.

The last mystery author that I'd like to mention is one of our own members, Rena Leith. She has written three mysteries with the same core characters and a resident ghost. The first book is titled *Murder on the Beach* in which you meet the main characters. Her mysteries are fun to read and I am looking forward to the publication of her next book.

Finally, I couldn't write about favorite female authors without mentioning Janet Evanovich, the author of the Stephanie Plum books. In a nutshell, her books make me laugh out loud. She has started another series that I haven't tried yet but will probably read in the future.

So Many books; so little time! Thanks for bearing with my ramblings. Until next time....
